Monition

The Augustinian family celebrates today the feast of Saint Clare of Montefalco, a model religious of total surrender to God and to her sisters.

She was born in Montefalco in the year 1268, and died in Perusa in 1308. She made her religious profession with the name, *Clare of the Cross*. She was demanding with herself and with the sisters, especially in common life, as stated in the Rule of Saint Augustine. He recommended the spirit of sacrifice and personal asceticism as bases of a solid spiritual life. The passion and the cross of Jesus were her preferred devotions.

Invitation to penance

As we begin this Eucharistic celebration, let us ask God to grant us the conversion of our hearts, thus, we shall attain reconciliation and the growth of our communion with God and with our brothers.

SAINT EZEKIEL MORENO, BISHOP

If a deacon is present, he reads the monition (introduction) after the sign of the cross and the greeting, before the invitation to penance. If however there is no deacon present, the commentator, reads the introduction before the entrance hymn. The entrance antiphon is only recited when there is no entrance hymn. St. Ezekiel Moreno is celebrated as a FEAST for the Recollects in the Iberian Peninsula and Latin America, thus the Gloria is recited or sung. For the Recollects in the Philippines, Taiwan and Sierra Leone, it is celebrated as a SOLEMNITY, thus the Gloria is said or sung, and Credo is recited. Obligatory memorial for other places.

Entrance Antiphon

Cf. Ps 105 (104):1

O give thanks to the Lord, and call on his name. Make known his deeds among the peoples.

Monition

St. Ezekial Moreno was born in Alfaro (Logroño) on April 9, 1848. After professing as an Augustinian Recollect, he travelled to the Philippines, where he was ordained priest and worked with exemplary apostolic zeal. Since 1888, he lived in Columbia where he developed a multifarious evangelizing work. He was named Apostolic Vicar of Casanare and was ordained bishop in 1894. On June 10, 1896, he took possession of the Diocese of Pasto.

In his sincere desire to serve, he drew an unfailing strength when the interests of Christ and the Church were involved. As a shepherd completely devoted to his faithful, he bore with firmness all kinds of trials, including the painful cancer that accompanied him during the last months of his life and that brought him to retire at the convent of Monteagudo, where he died on August 19, 1906. He was canonized by John Paul II in Sto. Domingo (Dominican Republic) on October 11, 1992, during the closing of the Fifth Centenary of the Evangelization of Latin America. May his example and intercession help us to live faithfully the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

SAINT PIUS X, POPE

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Monition

We, Augustinian Recollects, call to mind today Pope Saint Pius X, to whom we owe our elevation to the rank of an Order, which was realized through the brief *Religiosas Familias* of September 16, 1912.

Saint Pius X, was born Giuseppe Melchiorre (Joseph Melchor) Sarto in Northern Italy in the year 1835. At 23, he was ordained priest and named bishop of Mantua in 1884; was a cardinal archbishop of Venice in 1893, and was elected pope 1903.

He promoted traditional devotional practices and orthodox theology. His most important reform was to publish the first <u>Code of Canon Law</u> into one volume. He was noted for his conservative theology and reforms in liturgy and church law. Pius X worked to increase devotion in the lives of the clergy and <u>laity</u>, particularly in the <u>Breviary</u>, which he <u>reformed considerably</u>, and the <u>Holy Mass</u>. He restored to prominence Gregorian Chant, and placed a renewed <u>liturgical</u> emphasis on the <u>Eucharist</u>, saying, "Holy Communion is the shortest and safest way to Heaven." He encouraged frequent reception of Holy Communion. Pius X said in his 1903 motu proprio 'Tra le sollecitudine': The primary and indispensable source of the true Christian spirit is participation in the most holy mysteries and in the public, official prayer of the church.

His program of governance had three fundamental points: first, doctrinal formation that he promoted with the publication of his catechism; second, the intensification of the spiritual and liturgical life, importance of frequent communion and fostered the access of the children to the Eucharist; finally, he moved for the autonomy of the Church. As we recall today Saint Pius X, the Order of Augustinian Recollects desires to appropriate for itself his motto, "To establish everything in Christ," meeting Christ and walking from Him once again.

Monition

Today, we celebrate the feast of Saint Monica, born in Tagaste (Argelia) in the year 331, of a well-to-do and deeply Christian family. At the peak of her youth, she married Patricius, who was not yet a Christian. We know her well through the references, which her son, Augustine, left us in the book of his *Confessions*: the maturity of her faith, her courage as a Christian woman; now she tried to obtain through her prayer and tears the conversion of her husband and son.

She was an admirable example of a mother and a Christian wife. Proven in faith, she persevered faithfully in the mission that God had entrusted her. She died in Ostia Tiberina at the age of 56 in 387. The narrative that Augustine has left us regarding his conversation with his mother, her death and funeral is touching. Her remains are preserved in the Church of Saint Augustine in Rome.

In our present times, many mothers have united themselves in emulating Saint Monica and they pray unceasingly for the faith of their children. We all pray for them and their intentions, as we put our lives into the hands of God, trusting fully in Him.

After a long period of a restless journey in search for a meaningful life, he ended up a convert to Catholicism. He was baptized on Easter eve through the ministry of the bishop Saint Ambrose.

He wrote in his *Confessions*: "Lord, you made us for yourself and our hearts are restless until they rest in you."

In the light of his profound doctrine and unwavering faith, he earned the title, "Father and Doctor of the Church." His theological doctrines and profound reflections in his *Confessions*, his homilies and catechesis from his vast literary works have influenced deeply the thinking and faith of the Church for many centuries. In the words of Pope Benedict XVI, Saint Augustine was a man of great passion and faith, a man of great intelligence and enduring dedication to pastoral ministry.

In his *Confessions*, he exclaimed: "Late have I loved you, O beauty ever ancient ever new. You were with me, but I was out of myself; You were there with me but I was not there with you ... You called me, you shouted at me until my deafness gave way to you. Your brilliance and splendor burned brightly and your splendor dissipated my blindness." (X, 27, 38) He died on August 28, 430 at the age of 76.
